Give, Go, Pray

Jesus said, Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age (Matthew 28:19-20).

Pray. When we pray, we reach out to God and express our hope for the success of missions. Prayer can also involve listening to God for His direction as we pray. He may be opening doors for your involvement and support. Let your prayers include talking, thinking, and listening. Therefore, I tell you, whatever you ask for in prayer, believe that you have received it, and it will be yours (Mark 11:24).
